

DR. WILLIAM SALANT, PHYSIOLOGIST, IS DEAD

U. S. Pharmacologist, 1908-18,
Professor at Georgia 9 Years

Dr. William Salant, pharmacologist and physiologist, died Friday in his home at 617 West End Avenue at the age of 73.

He had been chief pharmacologist of the bureau of chemistry, United States Department of Agriculture, from 1908 to 1918, Professor of Physiology and Pharmacology at the University of Georgia Medical School from 1920 to 1929 and research pharmacologist of the biological laboratory at Cold Spring Harbor, L. I., from 1929 to 1932.

Dr. Salant had conducted experiments with animals establishing that fasting and diet affect the action of poisons and drugs introduced into the living system.

Born in Courland, Russia, the son of Solomon and Theresa Geffen Salant, he came to the United States in 1884. Ten years later he received a B. S. degree from Cornell and a medical degree from the College of Physicians and Surgeons in 1899.

Surviving are a son, Edward O. Salant; three brothers, Aaron B., Henry and Louis Salant, and a sister, Mrs. Harriet Salant Winter.

AARON SALANT, 89, EX-APPAREL MAKER

Aaron B. Salant, former chairman and president of Salant & Salant, Inc., apparel manufacturers at 330 Fifth Avenue, died Friday at his apartment in the Volney Hotel. His age was 89.

Mr. Salant was president of the company from 1936 to 1946 and chairman from then until his retirement two years ago. He was a member of the New York bar, but had not practiced law.

He was graduated in 1897 from City College as valedictorian of his class and the winner of some 15 prizes for scholarship. Mr. Salant then taught in the public schools, and in 1901 joined a predecessor of Salant & Salant.

Surviving are a son, Walter S. Salant, economist of the Brookings Institution; a daughter, Mrs. Marie S. Neuberger; a sister, Mrs. Harriet S. Winter; eight grandchildren, and three great-grandchildren.
